AWID CONFERENCE REPORT

Report on the Fifth International Forum of the Association for Women in Development, November 21-24, 1991, Washington, D.C.

The 1991 Forum, Learning Together, Working Together: A South-North Dialogue, brought together eleven hundred women and men from around the world to exchange experiences and ideas on the rapidly evolving field of women and development. AWID is committed to promoting a trialogue among scholars, policy makers and practitioners, and all three groups have actively contributed to the strength of previous conferences. Yet because of their easier access to travel funding, scholars and policy people have tended to outnumber those actually running the programs and doing the work at the grassroots level. Given the vitality and variety of programming for women now occurring internationally, it was decided to make this a practitioner driven conference.

To do this, it was necessary to locate people in innovative programs in every region of the world who were willing to come to Washington and share what they were doing. At the same time, it was necessary to raise the money to bring them. Using a variety of networks the Conference committee mailed more than 11,000 calls for participation, and directly raised more than \$300,000 to bring a representative sample of those who responded. Presenters came from more than 60 countries; of these 57% were international and 15% were from the community level in North America.

A practitioner driven conference also meant modifying the standard conference format to permit more opportunities for dialogue and

exchange. The program was designed to examine issues and strategies in seven areas:

- -Work
- -Education
- -Health
- -Family
- -Political participation
- -Environment
- -Institutional Development

And the ideas flew thick and fast. Over the past two decades a great deal of "how to" experience has been accumulated, and people are eager for exchange. To give an idea of the variety, these are a few of the Friday morning sessions:

- -Women and Credit; Models that Work. -Women Writers under Dictatorships.
- -Gender Issues in Big Business: New Possibilities and Continuing Perils.
- -How to Use Film to Organize.
- -Strategies for Insuring Women's Legal Rights.
- -Global Perspectives on Women and AIDS.
- -Meeting the Intersecting Needs of Women and Children: Programs in India and Inner-city Washington.

In some areas, international networks are strong, in others they are just beginning, but the synergy from having so many in one place at one time was simply overwhelming.

Fortunately, through a complicated package of funding strategies, UIUC was well represented. Twelve graduate students and four faculty attended. Three students, Lucy Kehinde, Grace Malindi and Rosintan Panjaitan, organized and participated in a panel Delivering Agricultural Information to Women Farmers-Grassroots Perspectives from Africa, Asia and North America. Kate Cloud co-chaired two workshops, a pre-conference workshop Tools for Gender Trainers and Working with National level Statistics-a Gender Training Workshop. The report of the Bergen Conference in which the Office collaborated and the registry of gender training which we developed, were also distributed during the series of gender training presentations at the Forum.

All in all, the forum was an enormous success. It was rich, varied, vivid, well organized, and professional in a deeply feminist way. It demonstrated what we all have believed; that women can do the work of the world in varied ways, and in respectful dialogue, learn from one another, and support one another. It actualized DAWN's vision "that feminism is a political movement, and...therefore can be diverse in its issues, immediate goals and methods. But beneath this diversity, feminism has at its unshakable core, a commitment to breaking down the structures of gender subordination and a vision of women as full and equal participants with men at all levels of societal life".

STUDY AND TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

Summer Institute for African Agricultural Research, July 5-24, 1992, University of Wisconsin, Madison. The primary objective is to complement the research training of African PhD students through intensive interaction with leading researchers experienced in African agriculture and also to enhance the U.S. education of African PhD students by facilitating disucssions among students' advisors, African researchers, donor agencies and institutions. The Summer Institute is for African PhD students who are studying in the United States and who plan to conduct thesis research in Africa. Students in the social, biological and physical sciences working on African food and agricultural issues may apply. Students preparing their thesis research proposals will receive priority in the selection process. Student advisors are invited to participate for three days. FELLOWSHIPS, GRANTS, AND AWARDS

1. Students:

Rockefeller Foundation's Re-entry Grants for African Scholars Pursuing Education Research. This grants program is designed to assist in the professional re-establishment of talented African Scholars who are returning from doctoral studies abroad and have a research interest in issues related to the revitalization and development of education in sub-Saharan Africa. All proposed projects must include an explicit and substantial focus on female school participation as part of the set of educational issues to be Applicants may submit research proposals prior to or within one year of returning to their Africa-based institutions. Grants are made to the scholar, but the proposal must be endorsed by the African institution where the applicant will be a full-time staff member. There are no deadlines for submission of proposals. The World Bank Graduate Scholarship Program. The World Bank, with grant funding from the Government of Japan, has established a scholarship program for graduate studies leading to a higher degree in a development-related social science. Scholarships are available to applicants mainly from developing countries who intend to pursue a career in a development field. It is anticipated that each scholship recipient will return to their home country at the conclusion of their studies to apply their enhanced knowledge and skills to help accelerate the pace of economic and social development. Applications must be received before March 1, 1992. Nelle M. Signor Fellowships on International Relations are being offered by International Programs and Studies in conjunction with the Departments of History and Political Science at the University of Illinois for dissertation research or writing in the area of international relations for 1992-93. Any unmarried student whose dissertation topic is in the field of international relations is eligible for the program, regardless of the department of study. Applicants must have completed their preliminary exams at the time application and must be nominated by their respective departments. Latin American Language and Area Studies Fellowships, 1992-93, University of Illinois. Candidates must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents; graduate students enrolled in good standing at the university; pursuing advanced training with Latin American area courses or international aspects of professional study; and must enroll in advanced Protuguese, Quechua, or Spanish courses. Native speakers of Latin American languages and students preparing to teach English as a second or roreign language are not eligible. Tuition and fees, plus a stipend (to be announced). Departments must forward ranked applications by February 28, 1992. Summer Intensive Language Fellowships, 1992. Two fellowships will be awarded to eligible graduate students from UIUC to study at any approved institution in the United States or abroad which offers the equivalent of an academic year of language instruction in Brazilian, Portuguese or Amerindian languages during the summer of 1992. Candidates from all departments and professional schools are encouraged to apply. Deadline: February 28, 1992. Ronnie Hann, address same as above. Tinker Research Grants for 1992 for funding for travel to field site, in-country travel and lodging expenses with possibility of funding for expendable supplies and processing of research materials for pilot research studies in Latin America and the Spanish-speaking Caribbean. The grant usually covers six to fourteen weeks of field research (Summer through December). Master's degree candidates, professional degree of candidates, Ph.D. candidates and junior faculty of any unit at UIUC are eligible to apply. Application materials due in the Center by Friday, March 6,1992.

Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowships for the Study of Africa, University of Illinois. Applications are invited for African Language and area study at the masters and doctoral levels at the University of Illinois under the Higher Education Act, Title VI. Pending funding from the U.S. Department of Education, during the 1992-93 academic year the center anticipates awarding fellowships for African area studies, which include the study of African languages, both in its own interdisciplinary masters program and in the masters and doctoral programs of cooperating departments. The center is proposing to offer fellowships for the study of Afrikaans, Amharic, Bambara, Hausa, Lingala, Swahili,

Wolof, and Zulu. Other languages may be eligible by special request. Minority applications are especially encouraged, as are applications which combine area studies with work in a professional curriculum. Candidates must be American citizens or permanent residents, hold a bachelor's degree at the time graduate study is to begin, be admitted to a graduate program at the university, and undertake a combination of African language and area study courses. Students not currently enrolled at the university are encouraged to inform the Center for African Studies and their disciplinary department of their intent to apply for this competition. Deadline: February 29, 1992.

Summer Fellowships. The center also awards fellowships for the intensive study of African languages during the summer. These fellowships are tenable at Illinois or at any other participating institution. Funds exist to support the travel costs of students who opt to study on other campuses. Deadline for applications for summer school only is April 15, 1992.
